2. Presenter/s Biography (short) Professor Finch is an NHMRC Principal Research Fellow and is the Robert HT Smith Personal Chair in Sports Safety at Federation University Australia. She is also Director of the Australian Centre for Research into Injury in Sport and its Prevention (ACRISP) which is one of only 4 research centres worldwide to be recognised by the International Olympic Committee as a Research Centre for the Prevention of Injury and Protection of Athlete Health. Prof Finch's research has been funded by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC), Australian Research Council (ARC), International Olympic Committee (IOC), US National Institutes of Health, Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing and from peak sports bodies including the International Rugby Board, Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA), Australian Football League (AFL) and Cricket Australia. She is the Inaugural Associate Editor for Implementation and Dissemination for the British Journal of Sports Medicine. She is a member of the editorial boards of Injury Prevention, Journal of

Science and Medicine in Sport, Sport Medicine, Injury Epidemiology and the International Journal of Injury Control & Safety Promotion. Prof Finch is strongly committed towards ensuring that her research has a very real impact on the policy and practice setting in which she works. Her research has been adopted by Government Departments of Sport and Health, health promotion and injury prevention agencies, and peak sports bodies (such as the AFL) and directly used to inform safety policy.
